Microchips: Is there really a difference?

1 in 3 pets will become lost during their lifetime. It's reality: pets get lost. Without proper identification, most never return home. According to the American Humane Association, only 15% of lost dogs and 2% of lost cats ever find their way back home. Almost 4 million pets are euthanized every year, including lost pets whose owners weren't found in time. Microchips for dogs and cats can prevent your pet from being euthanized if lost and can help reunite you with your pet!

Mackenzie's uses the HomeAgain pet microchip identification and recovery system because it includes a national database registry network of over 350,000 vets, animal shelters, volunteer pet rescues, and additional pet safety wellness services designed to prevent your pet from becoming an unfortunate statistic. Give your pet the protection they need with pet microchipping. In 2009, HomeAgain reunited over 600,000 pets with their owners after being lost.

Other microchipping clinics may be cheaper, but your dog may not be placed in a national database. It's important to do your research and know where your money is going. To ensure that your four-legged friend comes home safely, have them microchipped at one of Mackenzie's HomeAgain microchip clinics.

Meet Patches

Patches was barely alive and was a mere 18 pounds when Kent County Animal Control arrived.

"We just couldn't believe the condition she was in when we found her," said Stephanie Ellinger, Animal Control Officer Supervisor for Kent County. "She was chained to a doghouse, with no food or water, and in freezing weather. She was too weak to greet us or even hold her head up when we approached her."

Officer Kali Johnson rescued Patches from a backyard in Grand Rapids just hours before she would have frozen to death.

"First Option... Adoption" is a campaign to educate people on animal overpopulation and to encourage adoption in hopes of reducing the number of animals that are euthanized each year. Every year, thousands of animals are euthanized in West Michigan. Mackenzie's is a no-kill dog sanctuary, but even with our extensive efforts we can only house a certain number of dogs each year. We hope to continue to see an increase in adoptions so that we can in return rescue more dogs that would otherwise be euthanized.

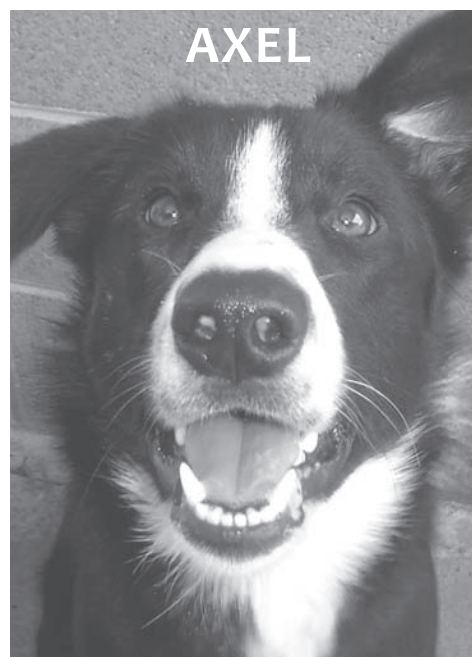
Why consider Mackenzie's ?

1. Prevention:

Patches continued...

Patches was quickly transferred to a nearby veterinary clinic for emergency medical care where she was treated for malnutrition, dehydration, hypothermia, and multiple wounds on her face and legs. It was apparent Patches had been eating dirt to try to stay alive, but the cold weather and lack of water were proving to be too much for her little body to take. Every year Kent County Animal Control finds dogs frozen to death in their dog houses. Patches was a lucky survivor, and thanks to Mackenzie's her future is bright.

Today, Patches is a healthy 50 pounds and has a forever home at Mackenzie's. Recovery is day to day for dogs like Patches who have been abused, abandoned and neglected. It takes time for them to heal and learn to trust that they are going to be fed, cared for and loved. Every day thousands of dogs are left to fend for themselves. But how are they expected to survive when chained up? Or put on the street? Lets do our part and stop this vicious cycle.
